John Randall



John Randall (1716-1799) was an English organist and academic. He worked at the University of Cambridge, first as the organist of King's College, and later as Professor of Music. The memorial where he is buried in Cambridge has the inscription *The sweetness of his harmonies charmed the ear, and the mildness of his manners the heart.*

Anglican chant composed by John Jones (1728-1796), who was a boy chorister at St. Paul's Cathedral in London, and later the Organist of the Temple Church, the Charterhouse, and St. Paul's Cathedral.

Anglican chant composed by Sir Frederick Arthur Gore Ouseley (1825-1889), an English organist and priest. He founded St. Michael's College (near Worcester), a choir school intended to serve as a model for Anglican church music.

**The First Lesson, Job 38:1-11; 42:1-5**

The LORD answered Job out of the whirlwind: "Who is this that darkens counsel by words without knowledge? Gird up your loins like a man, I will question you, and you shall declare to me. Where were you when I laid the foundation of the earth? Tell me, if you have understanding. Who determined its measurements—surely you know! Or who stretched the line upon it? On what were its bases sunk, or who laid its cornerstone, when the morning stars sang together, and all the sons of God shouted for joy? Or who shut in the sea with doors, when it burst forth from the womb; when I made clouds its garment, and thick darkness its swaddling band, and prescribed bounds for it, and set bars and doors, and said, 'Thus far shall you come, and no farther, and here shall your proud waves be stayed?'" Then Job answered the LORD: "I know that thou canst do all things, and that no purpose of thine can be thwarted. 'Who is this that hides counsel without knowledge?' Therefore I have uttered what I did not understand, things too wonderful for me, which I did not know. 'Hear,

and I will speak; I will question you, and you declare to me.' I had heard of thee by the hearing of the ear, but now my eye sees thee."

He remembering his mercy hath holpen his servant Israel, as he promised to our forefathers, Abraham and his seed for ever.

Music composed by Sir George Dyson (1883-1964), Director of the Royal College of Music in London. Dyson said of himself as a composer, "My reputation is that of a good technician ... not markedly original. I am familiar with modern idioms but they are outside the vocabulary of what I want to say".
