



Psalm 27 Dominus illuminatio Joseph Harris



Anglican chant composed by Joseph Harris (1743-1814), an English organist and composer. He graduated from the University of Oxford with a Bachelor of Music in 1773, and was hired as organist at St. Martin's Church in Birmingham in 1787.

- 1 The LORD is my light and my salvation; whom then / shall I / fear? * the LORD is the strength of my life; of whom then / shall I / be a / fraid?
- 2 When evildoers came upon me to eat / up my / flesh, * it was they my foes and my / adversaries who / stumbled and / fell.
- 3 Though an army should en / camp a / gainst me, * yet my / heart shall not / be a / fraid;
- 4 And though war should rise / up a / gainst me, * yet will I / put my / trust in / him.
- 5 One thing have I asked of the LORD; / one thing I / seek; * that I may dwell in the house of the / LORD all the / days of my / life;
- 6 To behold the fair / <u>beauty of the</u> / LORD * and to / seek him / in his / temple.
- 7 For in the day of trouble he shall keep me / <u>safe in</u> his / shelter; * he shall hide me in the secrecy of his dwelling, and set me / high up / on a / rock.
- 8 Even now he lifts / up my / head * above my / ene mies / round a / bout me.
- 9 Therefore I will offer in his dwelling an oblation with / <u>sounds of great / gladness</u>; * I will sing and make / music / to the / LORD.
- 10 Hearken to my voice O / LORD when I / call; * have / mercy on / me and / answer me.
- 11 You speak in my heart and say / "Seek my / face." * Your / face LORD / will I seek.
- 12 Hide not your / **face** / from me, * nor turn away your / servant / in dis / pleasure.
- 13 You have been my helper; cast me / not a / way; * do not forsake me O / God of / my sal / vation.

- 14 Though my father and my / mother for / sake me, * the / LORD / will sus / tain me.
- 15 Show me your / way O / LORD; * lead me on a level / path be / <u>cause of my</u> / enemies.
- 16 Deliver me not into the / <u>hand of my</u> / adversaries, * for false witnesses have risen up against me, and also / those who / **speak** / malice.
- 17 What if I had not believed that I should see the / goodness of the / LORD * in the / land / of the / living!
- 18 O tarry and await the LORD'S pleasure; be strong and he shall / <u>comfort</u> your / heart; * wait / <u>patient</u>ly / for the / LORD.

Psalm 28 Ad te, Domine Edwin George Monk



Anglican chant composed by Edwin George Monk (1819-1900), an English church organist and composer. He was the Organist and Master of the Choristers at York Minster for a quarter of a century, and was previously associated with St Columba's and Radley Colleges.

Anglican chant composed by Samuel Sebastian Wesley (1810-1876), Organist of many different churches including Winchester, Gloucester, Exeter and Hereford Cathedrals – during his career. He composed the music for The Church's one foundation, Hymn #525.


When Rehobo'am came to Jerusalem, he assembled all the house of Judah, and the tribe of Benjamin, a hundred and eighty thousand chosen warriors, to fight against the house of Israel, to restore the kingdom to Rehobo'am the son of Solomon. But the word of God came to Shemai'ah the man of God: "Say to Rehobo'am the son of Solomon, king of Judah, and to all the house of Judah and Benjamin, and to the rest of the people, 'Thus says the LORD, You shall not go up or fight against your kinsmen the people of Israel. Return every man to his home, for this thing is from me." So they hearkened to the word of the LORD, and went home again, according to the word of the LORD. Then Jerobo'am built Shechem in the hill country of E'phraim, and dwelt there; and he went out from there and built Penu'el. And Jerobo'am said in his heart, "Now the kingdom will turn back to the house of David; if this people go up to offer sacrifices in the house of the LORD at Jerusalem, then the heart of this people will turn again to their lord, to Rehobo'am king of Judah, and they will kill me and return to Rehobo'am king of Judah." So the king took counsel, and made two calves of gold. And he said to the people, "You have gone up to Jerusalem long enough. Behold your gods, O Israel, who brought you up out of the land of Egypt." And he set one in Bethel, and the other he put in Dan. And this thing became a sin, for the people went to the one at Bethel and to the other as far as Dan. He also made houses on high places, and appointed priests from among all the people, who were not of the Levites. And Jerobo'am appointed a feast on the fifteenth day of the eighth month like the feast that was in Judah, and he offered sacrifices upon the altar; so he did in Bethel, sacrificing to the calves that he had made. And he placed in Bethel the priests of the high places that he had made. He went up to the altar which he had made in Bethel on the fifteenth day in the eighth month, in the month which he had devised of his own heart; and he ordained a feast for the people of Israel, and went up to the altar to burn incense.


The Jews took up stones again to stone Jesus. He answered them, "I have shown you many good works from the Father; for which of these do you stone me?" The Jews answered him, "It is not for a good work that we stone you but for blasphemy; because you, being a man, make yourself God." Jesus answered them, "Is it not written in your law, 'I said, you are gods'? If he called them gods to whom the word of God came (and scripture cannot be broken), do you say of him whom the Father consecrated and sent into the world, 'You are blaspheming,' because I said, 'I am the Son of God'? If I am not doing the works of my Father, then do not believe me; but if I do them, even though you do not believe me, believe the works, that you may know and understand that the Father is in me and I am in the Father." Again they tried to arrest him, but he escaped from their hands. He went away again across the Jordan to the place where John at first baptized, and there he remained. And many came to him; and they said, "John did no sign, but everything that John said about this man was true." And many believed in him there.




